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PASTOR'S NARRATIVE

e began 2023 in worship taking a "star word." The use of star words is a prayer practice connected to Epiphany and the new year that has been growing in popularity in Protestant churches for nearly a decade. The practice involves holding a word before you throughout the year to consistently reflect on how God is moving through, around, or in connection to that word in your life. At our Epiphany service, we were invited to draw our star word from off the Table (or on "chat" or email if you were worshiping online). I encouraged everyone to trust the word they would draw and not to replace the word. Along with everyone else, with much anticipation to see what word God had chosen for me, I too took a word. It was not a big fancy word. It was a short, three letter word: "See." I tried hard not to let my disappointment show and I was hoping for a "better" word. But I had just told everyone to trust the word they got, and so I had to do the same.

As it turns out, there may not have been a better word. "See" was a good word for 2023, for me and for United Christian Parish. We implemented a Sustainability Task Force to see how to sustain the financial viability of the parish. We looked to see if there was a more efficient way for our organizational structure and approved changes to our Constitution and By-laws. We will continue to see if those changes are doing what we hoped. We looked back as we celebrated our 50th anniversary, looked to see where we can serve in the present, and looked to see into the future. In all this, it was important to see God working with and guiding us.

My star word was not just for UCP. It was for me, a year of seeing how and why I have been called to ministry at the parish. It was a year to see how God is working in my life and my ministry. Especially with Marcus' departure, it became a year to see what I can do, and what I can't. What I saw is that I cannot do it all, but God does not expect me to. For we are a united parish, we work together, we dream together, and together we see what God is calling and equipping us to do. It was a year to see that God has been with us, is with us, and will be with us as we move through 2024 and into the future.

My 2024 star word is two words: "Draw Near." I look forward to drawing nearer to God, to our community and to you as we work together toward our goal to build spiritual connections. May you see God in ways you may not have seen God before. May you see Christ in your lives and draw nearer to the God who loves you, unconditionally, with a love that never ends.

OUR 50TH ANNIVERSARY YEAR WAS ONE BRIMMING WITH SIGNIFICANT ACTIVITIES AND CHANGES.

Rejoice in hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer.
Romans 12:12

ffective steering requires the boat to move faster than the current, necessitating deliberate effort from the crew to ensure safety and direction. Our 50th anniversary year, 2023, was one brimming with significant activities and changes. Both the Board and the congregation have vigorously paddled through these times. Let's take a moment to review some highlights from our collective journey.

Celebrating – 50th Anniversary

Building on the efforts from late 2022, the 50th Anniversary Committee successfully orchestrated our 50th anniversary celebration. The commemorative Pentecost service and dinner drew not only current members but also former members and staff of United Christian Parish, who in some instances journeyed from long distances to participate. As a church, we embraced this milestone as a pivotal moment in our ongoing narrative, encapsulated by a threefold theme: "Reflecting on the Past, Celebrating the Present, and Preparing for the Future."

Streamlining Governance

In 2022, we recognized that UCP's governance structure and processes were too cumbersome for a church of our size. To address this disparity, the Streamlining Task Force conducted a thorough review and presented a proposal to the Board, which the congregation approved on March 19, 2023. We initiated the transition to this new system in June 2023, coincident

with the new terms for the Board and other ministries and councils.

At each subsequent Board meeting, we assess the efficacy of these changes and tackle any identified issues. Initially, the focus was on determining representation for each ministry within the Board. More recently, we've shifted towards developing detailed job descriptions for positions that the Lay Leadership Nominating Committee (LLNC) will need to fill. Our preliminary assessments indicate that the current process is more streamlined and efficient than the prior one. We are committed to ongoing evaluation and will make further adjustments as needed.

Planning and Budgeting for Sustainability

In late 2022, faced with the prospect of a tenth consecutive year of budget deficits and dwindling reserves, the United Christian Parish Board established the Sustainability Task Force (STF) led by Bob Haley. The task force's goal was to address the urgent threat to UCP's financial sustainability.

Early in 2023, the STF generated 30 innovative strategies to curb the deficit, including initiatives like the "50 for 50" fundraising campaign and a strategic emphasis on increasing rental income. Thanks in part to the implementation of these ideas and continuing focus on sustainability, we are now forecasting a significantly reduced budget deficit for 2024, estimated at \$40K, compared to the actual deficit of approximately \$96K for 2023—both of which are substantial improvements from the budgeted 2023

deficit of \$143K. Although challenges remain, these figures represent a positive shift in our financial trajectory.

The Sustainability Task Force remains dedicated to steering UCP towards achieving a positive cash flow. The STF plans another brainstorming session in early 2024 to continue this momentum and identify further opportunities for financial improvement.

Discerning our Pastoral Model

This past August, Rev. Marcus Leathers announced his departure, prompting immediate actions by the UCP Board to manage his transition and maintain continuity in the tasks he performed. The Board realized that it shouldn't just drift into a new Pastoral Model; instead a more deliberate approach was necessary to shape our future pastoral staff and task allocations.

Consequently, in October, we initiated the Pastoral Model Task Force (PMTF), cochaired by Sara McAlpine, to proactively define our next steps. Currently, the PMTF is completing its recruitment of additional volunteers, setting the stage for the substantial work ahead. From January through April, the PMTF's primary focus will be engaging with the congregation to understand the present needs and long-term goals, particularly ones requiring pastoral support.

The objective of the PMTF extends beyond immediate concerns; it aims to project and plan for the needs of our growing church and finances over the next three to five years. By April and May 2024, the team will synthesize the congregational feedback and begin discerning a strategic vision and approach. The culmination of this effort will be a comprehensive recommendation

to the UCP Board, expected by May or June 2024, outlining a forward-thinking Pastoral Model staffing plan over the next several years. The Board will, of course, keep the congregation informed of progress and seek approval if warranted or required.

Summary

This year has been a very active one for United Christian Parish. But thanks to the diligent work of many in the congregation, we are making progress on a number of very important fronts. We have a lighter weight, more streamlined organization with closer communication between the Board and the ministries and councils. Our approach to financial stewardship is yielding results, moving us closer to a deficit-free budget—a critical milestone for our long-term sustainability. Additionally, we're advancing towards a strategic decision in structuring and expanding our pastoral staff going forward so that we best serve the needs and wants of our congregation as a whole as we grow.

This year has been a very active one for United Christian Parish. But thanks to the diligent work of many in the congregation, we are making progress on a number of very important fronts.

You will find more in-depth information about United Christian Parish in the rest of this report. As we work through 2024, may God help us across all our missions and activities.

HUMAN & ADMINISTRATIVE RESOURCES COUNCIL REPORT

he pastors and staff at UCP are serving and blessing our congregation and community every day with a multitude of impressive skills and gifts. These include providing pastoral care and guiding faith formation, administering the church office,

providing communications in multiple formats, leading our music program, providing detailed bookkeeping, operating the Preschool, and coordinating use of the building through rentals and for UCP's church meetings and events.

While our pastors and staff are supporting us and taking care of UCP, the Human and Administrative Resources Council (HARC) has the primary responsibility and accountability for taking care of personnel matters for the Ministerial Team and UCP's paid staff. HARC has general oversight of parish administrative office operations and works with the UCP Technology Team to ensure that the office equipment and technology are meeting current needs. In 2023, HARC members worked with the church office to complete a significant effort to replace the office's outdated copier machine with a newer donated machine at a reduced cost to UCP.

During 2023, as we worked through HARC's timeline of annual tasks, we had to say farewell to the Rev. Dr. Marcus Leathers as he accepted a call to regional ministry as the Regional Minister of the Christian Church Capital Area. We look forward to continuing UCP's connection with Rev. Marcus Leathers in his role as the Disciples' Regional Minister. Rev. Leathers concluded his service at United Christian Parish as its Pastor for Congregational Care and Development on September 8.

In October, following the departure of Rev. Leathers,



the Parish Board initiated the Pastoral Model Task Force (PMTF), co-chaired by the HARC Chair, to proactively define and shape UCP's future pastoral staffing model and task allocations. This process is briefly described in "Discerning our Pastoral Model" in the Message from the Board in this Annual Report. Also, during 2023, with the help of members from Building and Grounds, HARC, Music, Worship and other volunteers, United Christian Parish signed our significant new renter, the Northern Virginia Music Teachers' Association (NVMTA). As UCP's building rental program has expanded, the role of UCP's Building Use Coordinator has changed accordingly, leading to a transition in that role in December, as we graciously said thank you to Bissi Badou and gave a warm welcome to Kevin Fletcher.

The Human and Administrative Resources Council appreciates the work of volunteers, including the members of HARC, who give their time and attention to taking care of our pastors and staff, such as—by letting our amazing staff members know they are appreciated or by answering phones in the church office when a staff member is out of office. BUILDING & GROUNDS/TRUSTEES COUNCIL REPORT

he Building & Grounds/Trustees (B&G/T) Council continued working to make our church comfortable and welcoming for members and visitors and environmentally friendly. The Council is responsible for negotiating, signing, and overseeing service contracts for maintenance and improvement of the United Christian Parish campus.

The most significant project of 2023 was renovation of the kitchen. Other major contracts this year included extensive tree work, storm water control cleaning, repair of heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) equipment, and continued custodial care, snow

and leaf removal, and yard maintenance.

To reduce energy consumption and save on maintenance costs, fluorescent light fixtures are being replaced with Light Emitting Diode (LED) fixtures as the older fixtures reach the end of their useful lives.

The Council arranged training in the use of our Automated External Defibrillator and Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation.

The Council also assisted in the development of additional building rental opportunities, to help provide much-needed income to the parish.

The B&G/T Council now consists of six members, three of whom serve as Commonwealth Trustees responsible for signing major contracts. In addition, the team includes many faithful and knowledgeable alumni. They do many smaller tasks themselves, to reduce the financial burden on the budget.

Rental income in 2022 was \$6,363.

Rental income in 2023 was \$16,956,

representing an increase of 166%.

CONGREGATIONAL CARE COUNCIL REPORT

he Congregational Care Council (CCC) reaches out to church members to foster connections through visits, home communion, phone calls and cards. CCC members also provide transportation and food to those who are sick or are in need of rides to doctor appointments or physical therapy sessions.

Collectively, CCC members contributed an average of 300 hours a month providing care for homebound individuals and for those who contacted the Samaritan of the Month or the church office in need of food or transportation. Congregational Care Council members

also made efforts to stay in touch with former members. In addition, CCC members provided mentoring to new members to connect them to people in the parish and church groups in which they may wish to participate.

The Fellowship Team, which is part of the CCC, continued to host several small groups—Women in the Spirit, Intercessory Prayer, Joyful Diners and Dine with Nine. The Fellowship Team fostered connection through hosting meals, coffee hours, picnics at Frying Pan Park's summer concert series and a chili cook-off. The Fellowship Team continued to provide meals at church-wide events such as the Fall and Christmas Festivals. All of these activities were done to make lasting connections.

Additionally, parishioners and friends experienced the joys of faith, fun, and fellowship through the Diamond Tours Lancaster Show Trip & the Dutch Country in November with the UCP Travel Ministry. After 16 Travel Ministry trips, this trip had the largest number of subscribers ever, with 37 enrolling.

Under the new streamlined governance organization, the Congregational Care Council takes a holistic approach to fostering spiritual connections.

In addition to caring for one another in times of change or need, the Congregational Care Council works with the Fellowship Team to host small groups for members to share their joys, challenges, and to seek spiritual guidance.


Reflecting on the Past 50 years; Celebrating the Present; Preparing for the Future
The United Christian Parish has spent the past 50 years building spiritual connections within our church community, across Reston, and around the world! Yet we continue to ask ourselves how we can create more. Prayer and conversation are two key elements

that strengthen the bonds among people developed in small groups. Intentional prayer sums up the activities of these groups, brings us closer together, allows us opportunities for joys and concerns, and promises the future within these groups and for the congregation at large. Beyond the well-established prayer groups, Women in the Spirit, or the Men's Breakfast, new spirited companion groups are encouraged to form and covenant in prayer through devotionals or just honest, trusted conversations.

Music has always been a key element of the parish. Vocal groups for all ages meet regularly and offer their gifts on a regular basis. Talent shows, recitals, and an annual Christmas Festival provide outlets that


supplement formal worship services for these groups to praise God. Our youth choir, Joyful Noise, has formed and gained strength this year, as our children grow and look for ways to continue the strong music foundation built in the Genesis Choir. Handbells and liturgical dance continue to flourish as their numbers recover from the COVID years. Several young people have often been overheard pleading for more organ music. And the whole congregation joins in regularly to celebrate milestone birthdays and anniversaries.

UCP's commitment to hybrid worship (in-person and livestreaming) remains unwavering. Attendance numbers show that a similar number of worshipers join online and in the sanctuary each Sunday and for special events. As our congregation ages and travels, members remind us how much they value the online, livestreaming worship and fellowship that UCP continues to support. Monthly Opportunity Fairs have highlighted ways that members and newcomers can serve in the Worship Ministry and other ministries and councils. Even though one of our pastors, Rev. Marcus Leathers, was called to a judicatory position within his denomination, the foundation of the spiritual connections he helped create remains strong. New connections will enable our numbers to grow and our spirituality to bind us in Christ.




SUNDAY WORSHIP By the Numbers

WITNESS MINISTRY REPORT

he Witness Ministry spreads the Good News to those who come to the parish for worship or participate in parish programs—inviting all to join in the life and work of the parish.

This Ministry is responsible for community outreach, visitor tracking and visitor follow-up. It works to ensure a presence at community events.

Witness continued with its staple programs in 2023—coordinating greeters, blessing animals at DogFest (54 dogs and two ferrets in 2023), monthly appearances at Reston Farmers market, advertising, etc.—in addition to attending ad hoc events (Lake Anne Reggae Festival and Lake Anne Christmas Festival).

Witness also spearheaded the successful effort to revive the talent show/chili cook-off—in collaboration with Worship and Fellowship (chili/dessert cookoff) ministries—after a few years' hiatus.

Joining the fray in 2023 were two new initiatives: spiritual yoga and adopt-a-spot at Lake Anne Park



(co-funded by the good folks of the Justice & Peace Ministry). UCP's monthly cleanup at Lake Anne Park started slowly but has grown in popularity, drawing in busloads of people from around the world pouring in to participate in this grand event. Witness welcomes suggestions for outreach ideas.

his past year the Justice & Peace Ministry (JPM) engaged in environmental, LGBTQ, racism, and diversity justice.

Environmental Justice

As a Presbyterian certified Earth Care congregation, United Christian Parish is deeply concerned and involved in preserving a healthy

environment locally in the community and around the church facility. UCP oversees Lake Anne Park, which means cleaning up, removing trash, and maintaining the park as a beautiful open space area for community use. Through the "Adopt-a-Highway" program, signage recognizes United Christian Parish.

Also, UCP maintains a pollination garden on church grounds initially planted by the Boy Scouts. Garden maintenance requires weeding, periodic replacement of plants, and removal of invasive plant species. Always looking for ideas to sustain and improve our environment, UCP participated in the Presbyterian Earth Care Conference. UCP also participated in the Mid-Atlantic Air Quality Data Collaboration which resulted in a small grant and ongoing monitoring of the air quality in and around the church.

Racial Justice

JPM continued the program series called "Diversity Matters" to bring us together as a congregation in understanding and addressing racism that continues to impact our society. We engaged in conversations around books and videos such as *A Brother's Peace* by Jan G. Linn; *How the Word is Passed* by Clint Smith; *Good Trouble* by John Lewis; and *The Boy in the Striped Pajamas* by John Boyne.

LGBTQ

JPM participated in the annual Reston Pride program at Lake Anne Plaza and engaged in conversation with several people who were looking for a local congregation.

Voter Registration

JPM participated in the Get Out the Vote Initiative by completing two hundred postcards to encourage voter registration in areas with low voter turnout. It is especially important that we continue this activity in preparation for the upcoming 2024 general election to promote democracy.

JPM published monthly articles in *Parish Life* to educate the UCP community about justice issues that impact society.

n 2023, the Environmental Justice Team renewed its focus on the native pollinator garden, adding several new shrubs and many new perennials that are better suited to the growing shade profile of the garden.

We continued our focus on outreach and education, providing numerous articles for *Parish Life* about practical ways we can all help address these issues. We contributed both financially and with our time to the Witness Ministry's adoption of a park for cleanup. We helped plan and run a special worship service in honor of Earth Day.

The Environmental Justice Team also

worked with the Building & Grounds Council to host an Air Quality Monitor. This monitor will contribute to a regional effort to gather data and support underserved communities in changing public policy and improving their communities.

In 2024, the Environmental Justice Team plans to continue and build on these successes. For the garden, we plan to add a sign visible on the street, to showcase the goal of the pollinator garden, and to seek funding for a modest effort for erosion control and fixed border. For outreach, we plan to sponsor one or more speakers to provide useful seminars. We will support the Earth Day service. We will explore renewable energy solutions and additional justice actions.

Genesis Choir was incorporated into the Bible Explorers time. The children shared their learning of Bible stories through song once a month in the worship service.

The Faith Formation Ministry will continue to listen to families about how we can support their children's spiritual growth and to pray for guidance in offering activities and events that will encourage more participation.

Connecting and Engaging with our Youth

We continued to have a small but mighty group of young people participating in our Youth Group program. In addition to our regular programming, they:

• Hosted an Easter Festival for church, preschool and community families. It included an egg hunt, Easter crafts and games, and bedecking our



sanctuary with butterflies.

- Planned and led worship on Pride Sunday in June.
- Assisted with games and crafts at the Easter Festival, Vacation Bible School, the Fall Festival, and hosted the Children's Shop at the Christmas Festival.

We moved the Youth Choir, Joyful Noise, rehearsals to Sunday mornings under the leadership of Misha, United Christian Parish Music Director. Joyful Noise sang on Youth Sunday, at the Thanksgiving Interfaith Service, and twice in worship during the fall.

Connecting and Engaging through Adult Faith Formation

Adult classes, both on Sunday morning and during the week, were hybrid. Bible 101 followed the scriptures used in worship each week. Living Your Faith studied a variety of topics to include:

- A Lenten Study using the music of Mark Miller, "Roll Down Justice"
- "Investing in our Planet" (in conjunction with Earth Day)
- A mini series on Artificial Intelligence
- A mini series on immigration
- A study on *Poverty by America* by Matthew Desmond

nited Christian Parish Preschool welcomed back 44 families with children ages 2-5 for the 2023-24 school year. Although our enrollment numbers were lower than expected, it didn't change our mission or enthusiasm for our exceptional school! We were so proud to welcome our entire staff of 19 back to the building in September. How lucky are we to have such a dedicated group of educators and administrators that remain committed to what we do every day.

We continue to use mitigation strategies to protect our students from illness, such as optional mask wearing, policy guidelines for communicable disease, lots of outdoor play, and encouraging vaccinations.

We passed our National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) accreditation assessment in March and will maintain these high standards until our next visit in 2028. We were recognized in the *Northern Virginia Magazine* "Best Preschools" issue for the fifth year in a row as well as showcased in the *Reston Letter* for our accomplishments.

Our Conscious Discipline Coach, Paula Kassraie, returned with even more enthusiasm and parents have been interested and engaged in this life changing social emotional literacy program.

The children continued yoga class once a month along with music and movement activities each day. Our Family Group grew, even with the lower enrollment, and we are confident it will continue to offer families a way to connect, learn, and grown together. They have organized fun events as well as fundraising for our scholarship fund. We welcomed a new Preschool Advisory Committee (PAC) chair, United Christian Parish member Britt Williams, along with three new members!

We are so humbled over the support we received from the members of this community and are very proud of the connections we have built with the members of United Christian Parish. We hope to continue to strengthen our relationship as part of this extraordinary ministry. We are looking forward to a robust enrollment season and will continue our mission to offer high quality early education for all children.





Total Missions Giving by Year




MISSIONS FUNDING By the Numbers


